

#### Keeping Students Safe Online – BYOD Device Registration

At Doha British School, we are committed to creating a safe and secure digital learning environment for all students. As part of our Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) programme, students can register one personal device (laptop or tablet) for educational use. To protect students and ensure responsible internet access, all devices must be registered with our IT Department.

#### Why Device Registration Matters

- Online Safety First The school's secure WiFi network includes safeguards to protect students from inappropriate content.
- Reliable Connectivity Only registered devices will have access to the internet to ensure a safe and structured learning experience.
- Preventing Misuse Unmonitored personal data connections (hotspots) can bypass school filters, increasing risks.

#### How Students Register Their Device

• Complete the Online Registration Form – Students must submit their details, including:

Student ID Student Name Year & Group Device type and MAC address (guidance provided in the form).

 No Need to Visit IT – Registration is processed remotely by the IT team, meaning there's no need for students to bring their device to the IT Office.

**Important:** A device may appear connected to Student WiFi, but internet access will only work once registration is completed.

#### Staying Safe Online – No Mobile Hotspots

Students must not share their mobile data (hotspots). Why? Personal networks cannot be monitored, meaning students could access unfiltered and unsafe content.

Misuse of mobile data that breaches the school's Acceptable Use Policy may result in disciplinary action.

#### **Annual Registration Renewal**

All devices must be re-registered each academic year. Unregistered devices will lose access to school WiFi. IT support will be available to help students with renewals.

#### Mow Students Will Be Informed:

This information will be shared with students via their Form Tutors and Google Classrooms to ensure everyone understands the process.

### RAMADAN PROCEDURE AT DOHA BRITISH SCHOOL

As a British school in Doha, we understand the importance of accommodating and respecting the observance of Ramadan. During this holy month, we have implemented the following procedures to ensure a supportive and inclusive environment for all students and staff:

#### **1. Reduced School Hours**

In accordance with the Ministry of Education's guidelines, our school operates on reduced hours during Ramadan.

#### 2. Fasting and Non-Fasting Classrooms

- Fasting Classrooms: At break and lunchtime, students who are fasting can use designated fasting classrooms. These are quiet spaces where they can rest or engage in light activities.
- **Non-Fasting Classrooms:** Students who are not fasting can eat in designated non-fasting classrooms during break and lunch. This ensures respect for those observing the fast.
- The canteen is closed during the holy month of Ramadan.

#### 3. Prayer Room

A dedicated prayer room is available for students who wish to perform their daily prayers, particularly the Dhuhr prayer. This space is supervised by our Arabic department, ensuring it is a quiet and respectful area for worship.

#### 4. General Etiquette


- All students are encouraged to show understanding and respect for their fasting peers during this time. Water Bottles are kept at the back of classrooms or outside.

This international assessment, conducted by the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), evaluates 15-year-old students' abilities in reading, mathematics, and science, providing valuable insights into global education standards.



PISA plays a crucial role in assessing how well students can apply their knowledge and skills to real-world situations. The results contribute to important educational research and help shape policies aimed at improving teaching and learning worldwide.

### DBS AK **MODELLING MOLECULAR STRUCTURES TO LIFE**






### A Hands-on Approach to UNDERSTANDING COMPLEX CONCEPTS

Understanding abstract scientific concepts can be challenging, especially when dealing with molecular structures that we cannot see or touch. In IB Chemistry, students often struggle with visualising molecular shapes, making it difficult to predict their properties and behaviours.

A lot of what we study in chemistry, and science in general, is based on rearranging, analysing or making predictions around things we're never actually able to see or feel.

Molecular shapes is a topic which my IB and AS level students have struggled with every year, and so I tried to find a way to let them build, visualise and change these structures for themselves. Students were able to make predictions for these structures that then applied to the real molecules they represented.





Research suggests that by giving students chance to explore the ideas as they are exposed to them, they are better able to store them in their long term memory and use them to problem solve. Modelling acts as a scaffold to support students as they learn tricky topics, so this activity despite looking simple, is a really supportive learning tool that students also enjoy.
